DISTRICT REPLY IN SUPPORT OF ITS
RESPONSE TO ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE
RE MIDDLE SCHOOL COURSES FOR HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT

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In its September 6, 2018 Order, the Court ordered the District to "show good cause why a Dual Credit program (MS-HS) is not offered at: Borman, Dietz, Lawrence 3-8, McCorkle (RC), Morgan Maxwell (RC), Rose (RC), and Secrist." [ECF 2123.] The District filed its Response to Order to Show Cause Re Middle School Courses for High School Credit on December 6, 2018, explaining that each District school with middle school grades provides students with the opportunity to take at least one middle school course for high school credit. [ECF 2157.] The Mendoza Plaintiffs filed a Supplementary Response seeking additional information [ECF 2171], and the Court issued an Order directing the District to include four categories of information in its reply: (1) an updated chart showing the physical location of middle school courses for high school credit; (2) an explanation of how students are informed of these courses when they are not held at the students' home schools; (3) enrollment data for these courses broken down by home school and student race/ethnicity; and (4) the District's actual use or planned use of the AGAVE program to provide these courses and the information upon which the District relied to determine this program's efficacy [ECF 2173]. This Supplementary Reply includes this information.

# A. Physical Location of Courses and Enrollment by Home School and Ethnicity

Exhibit A shows the physical location where middle school courses for high school credit are offered and the number of students in each course by ethnicity.

#### B. Information to Students When MS for HS Courses Not Held at Home School

Middle school students are informed by teachers, school administrators and school counselors regarding the availability of middle school courses for high school credit both when those courses are held at the home school and when there are options to attend at other schools or through AGAVE. With slight variations among schools based on their assessment of what may be most effective, schools inform students and their families of middle school for high school courses not held at their home school through personal consultation with students by administrators, teachers and counselors, flyers that are discussed in school and sent home with students, telephone calls home to

parents, social media targeted toward parents, recruitment events, student assemblies, classroom presentations, ParentLink, and as a part of the process for registering for courses with specific outreach to students based on results from benchmark and AZMerit assessments. The District also shares these various methods with school administrators to help provide additional information that could inform the most effective practices at each school.

#### C. Use of AGAVE for MS for HS Courses

AGAVE Middle & High School, a formal District school, serves students in grades 6-12 by giving them a complete curriculum through online learning. AGAVE effectively helps students obtain necessary courses according to their own pace and availability. Its mission is to provide equal access to a rigorous, standards-based high-quality curriculum in a virtual environment to meet the educational needs of all middle and high school students. AGAVE online courses provide additional opportunities for advanced learning experiences for students in grades 6-8 to enroll in high school level courses, which is particularly beneficial for smaller K-8 schools. AGAVE also allows students to take high school courses such as health during middle school to free up their future high school schedules so they may opt for more rigorous courses when they get to high school.<sup>1</sup>

For the past five years, Miles Pre-K-8 has successfully collaborated with AGAVE to offer Algebra 1 as a middle school course for high school credit, allowing its students to obtain high school credit by taking and passing the course through AGAVE. Miles students have been extremely successful in passing the Algebra 1 class and receiving high school credit online through AGAVE.

In SY 2018-19, two additional schools (Borman and Hollinger) collaborated with AGAVE to offer middle school courses to earn high school credit in an effort to expand

the availability of these courses to as many students as possible. Based on Miles' past success and on the effective offering of a complete middle school and high school curriculum through this platform historically, the District anticipates AGAVE will effectively allow students at Borman and Lawrence to study rigorous, high-school level courses (AGAVE also functions as a high school) while continuing to attend their home school.

The District plans to continue to utilize AGAVE to offer middle school courses for high school credit when that is the most effective option to provide middle school courses for high school credit, such as when an onsite teacher is unavailable or when the specific school and the District together decide that offering the course through AGAVE will provide the best opportunities for learning, integration and credit. Lawrence plans to offer an MS for HS course in a traditional classroom in SY 2019-20, rather than through AGAVE or Edgenuity. At the end of SY 2019-20, the District will again analyze the best way to provide these courses in each situation.

## **Conclusion**

As reported herein and in the District's Response to Order to Show Cause (ECF 2157), students at every District middle and K-8 school have the opportunity to take middle school courses for high school credit, and the District continues to seek innovative and effective ways to expand these courses' availability and participation. Accordingly, the District hereby provides notice that it is in compliance with the Court's orders on this subject.
