## SPECIAL MASTER'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATION WITH RESPECT TO THE PROPOSED BRIDGES HIGH SCHOOL

The Special Master recommends that the Court approve the District's proposed collaboration with the Pima County Joint Technical Education District (JTED) to establish a new career and technical high school. This high school will give TUSD students an extraordinary opportunity to develop knowledge and skills that are likely to provide them with exceptional employment prospects. Students will be provided with core academic courses and sophisticated career and technical skills that are in high demand (*e.g.*, robotics). Students will have the opportunity to earn industry certificates and credentials, participate in internships and externships, and engage in clinical experiences in dual college credit in many classes. The District would be unable to provide these learning opportunities without partnering with JTED.

Plaintiffs have expressed concern about the potential of the Bridges High School to be integrated. The District's analysis suggests that it will be integrated. There are no competitor schools with a similar curriculum. Gary Orfield, whose expertise is cited by the Mendoza plaintiffs, provided the Special Master with an example of a similar initiative which was well integrated by drawing students from throughout that district. The Mendoza plaintiffs are asking the Court to condition its approval on several next steps by the District. The Special Master sees no reason to hold up approval until the District essentially proves its commitment to integration. One can imagine that when the District provides the testimony that the Mendoza plaintiffs ask for, the plaintiffs will ask for evidence that the District's proposals will result in integration. Such evidence will be difficult to provide.

The Special Master believes that the District will act to ensure that Bridges High School will be integrated, especially if it manages enrollment through the lottery system – as the policy provides – to foster integration. But even if, despite good faith efforts by the District, it is not

integrated, the school will provide an extraordinary learning opportunity for students who do not intend to go on to college or who plan only to get a community college degree. This plan in one form or another has been on the agenda for many years. It is time to act now. Recommendation The Special Master recommends that the Court endorse the District's proposal for Bridges High School with one condition: that the District indicate how it proposes to use the lottery system to promote integration at the school. The Special Master does not intend by this recommendation to initiate another round of approvals, only to ensure that the District's commitment is part of the record.
