We are thrilled to announce the launch of our Black Girls Code Club at Blenman Elementary, marking the beginning of an exciting initiative to empower young women in technology. Utilizing curriculum from Black Girls That Code, our goal is to train 100 girls in coding by the end of the summer, with additional clubs set to launch throughout the year. In conjunction with the clubs, we will also offer coding camps at the African American Hub. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our generous donors for providing new MacBooks for the Hub, which will enhance our programs.



It's essential to address the underrepresentation of women, particularly women of color, in STEM fields—currently, only 3% of women in technology are Black. Engaging girls in coding not only fosters vital skills but has been shown to **boost math performance**, helping to pave the way for future opportunities in these crucial areas.
